BIOGRAPHICAL/HISTORICAL NOTE

Sabin J. Gianelloni, Sr., Italian immigrant from Corsica, began work as a clerk in a livery stable in Plaquemine, La. He married Julie Lefebvre in Jan. 1892 at St. John Catholic Church in Plaquemine. She was the daughter of Emile M. Lefebvre, owner of Longwood Plantation located across the Mississippi River in East Baton Rouge Parish, La. In 1892, Sabin, Sr., purchased one-fourth interest in the Longwood Plantation. In 1902, two years after Emile Lefebvre's death, he and Julie bought the remainder of the property from the other heirs and became the sole owners of the 5,000-acre plantation, which included the sugar factory, sawmill, and store. They also bought the adjacent Burtville Plantation. The couple had three sons, Vivian, Lefebvre, and Sabin, Jr. All three joined in the operation of the plantation and sugar factory until 1925, when mosaic disease destroyed nearly all the sugarcane fields in Louisiana, and Longwood ceased its cultivation of cane and manufacturing of sugar. Prior to purchasing the remainder of the plantation, Sabin, Sr. also served on the Board of Commissioners for the Pontchartrain Levee District (1899, 1901). Sabin J. Gianelloni, Sr., died in 1934.

While the mill remained idle, Sabin, Jr. experimented with syrup to improve quality. In 1937, the factory resumed operations as a syrup mill under the management of Sabin, Jr. As a producer, he served on the Louisiana Cane Syrup and Molasses Industry Advisory Board and as president of the Louisiana Syrup Association. In 1952, he discontinued operations at the mill and began a career as a beef producer. Sabin J. Gianelloni, Jr., died on October 18, 1977.

Vivian J. Gianelloni was born in Oct. 28, 1892 at Longwood Plantation. In 1913, he earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the Audubon Sugar School, Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge. After completing his education, he went to Cuba to begin his career in the sugar industry at the Punta Alegre Sugar Corp. During World War I, he served as a lieutenant in the artillery. He returned to Cuba after his discharge and rejoined the Punta Alegre Sugar Corp. He served as vice-president for ten years before becoming president of the company, a position he held for fifteen years. Vivian died Nov. 13, 1957.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Correspondence, business and financial documents, personal papers, and printed items comprise this collection. Papers pertain to the sugar industry, Louisiana cane syrup industry, and the operation of Longwood Plantation. Papers also reflect the federal government's agricultural policies, particularly during the 1930s and 1940s. Business correspondence relates to sugar and syrup production at Longwood Plantation in particular and the Louisiana syrup and sugar industries in general. Letters written between Sabin J. Gianelloni, Jr. and his brother, Vivian, reflect their personal business interests and family matters. Vivian's letters also offer insight into the political environment in Cuba prior to the Fidel Castro regime. Family correspondence discusses family matters, sugar industry, and the political environment in Louisiana, United States, Cuba, and Central America. Government correspondence written primarily between Sabin, Jr., and public officials relates to roads, levees, and his concern over the effects of federal rules and regulations on the syrup industry.

Business and financial papers pertain to the sugar and syrup industries, government policies relating to these industries, and the management of Longwood Plantation. They are comprised of contracts, accounts, records, quality standard, reports, bank records, production surveys, and payroll records. Papers concerning federal regulations have to do with wage legislation, price controls, quality reports, production controls, and statistics for syrup production.

A detailed history of Woodstock Plantation, Plaquemine, La. and ephemera make up personal papers. Printed items consist of advertisements, price lists, catalogs for plantation equipment, supplies, and services, publications, and material relating to government regulations on the syrup industry. Additionally, there are photographs of the Longwood Plantation store and sugar cane fields.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

Series I. Business and financial documents, 1887-1969, undated.

Subseries 1. Topical business files, 1887-1953.

These records relate to Longwood Plantation and other business interests of Sabin J. Gianelloni, Jr. Topical files are comprised primarily of contracts and agreements (1890-1916), tax records (1887-1937), boiler inspection reports (1909-1920), corporate licenses (1887-1931, 1952-1953), and weight reports submitted to the Sugar Bounty Bureau (1891-1895). Additional documents contain leases for the Maguire Building and Thomas Place in Baton Rouge, La (1909-1918), leases for tenant farmers at Longwood Plantation (1911, 1913) (1909-1918), scattered bank records (1889-1951, undated), registration certificates for automobiles (1916-1917), sugar licenses (1917-1918), cattle registration and vaccination records (1957-1960). There are also papers relative to a fire that took place in the Longwood sugarhouse on Nov. 2, 1912 (1912), the inventory of tobacco products in stock (1917), and a war emergency food survey inquiring about the nation's food supply during World War I (1917-1918). Manuscript volumes in this subseries are unbound and consist of a letter copybook for Longwood Plantation (1898 March-1905 May), a receipt book (1912-1914), and an unbound ledger (1915 Sept.-1922 Feb.).

Note: Files are arranged alphabetically and are accompanied by related correspondence.

Subseries 2. General business files, 1887-1969, undated.

Documents pertain to Gianelloni family business interests, particularly the sugar and syrup industries, and to the federal regulations affecting these industries. They consist of statements, receipts, accounts, payroll records (ca. 1890s, 1967-1968), expense accounts (1890-1896, 1930-1932), and production reports (1942-1946). They also contain freight records (1892-1910, 1931-1949), an inventory of livestock and equipment at Longwood Plantation (Aug. 1896), and reports for the Florida Sugar Co. (Jan.-May, 1910). Surveys furnish production totals for 1947 and 1948 (June 30, 1949). In addition there is an abstract of Woodstock Plantation is also included (1891). Manuscript volumes consist of an expense book (1887-1888), account books (1890-1892), daybooks (1890, 1933-1937), plantation diary (1891-1895), sugar production books (1898-1899), record books of crop production (1890-1892, 1898-1899), inventories for Longwood and Burtville plantations stores (1896-1955), and a small weather journal (1911).

Business papers relating specifically to government policies contain quality reports submitted to the War Food Administration Office (1944, 1946), a petition from the Louisiana Syrup Association urging Congress to minimum wage legislation (Oct. 1945), orders from the USDA offices (1943, 1951), and statistics on syrup production (undated). Syrup producers address their concerns with the Sugar Act in an incomplete statement (undated). Material pertaining to payment of a promissory note by Edgar A. Roberts (1893), and Sabin, Jr.'s efforts to obtain a trademark (1945) and copyright (1949). Are also present.

Series II. Correspondence, 1889-1975, undated.

Subseries 1. General business correspondence, 1889-1953, undated.

This subseries pertains to sugar and syrup production at Longwood Plantation and the Louisiana syrup and sugar industries in general. Early correspondence relates to the business affairs of Emile Lefebvre and Sabin J. Gianelloni, Sr. (1889-1905), particularly concerning Longwood Plantation. Later correspondence concerns the business dealings of Sabin, Jr. In his letters, he writes both as a syrup producer and as president of the Louisiana Syrup Association. Commission merchants, equipment manufacturers, vendors, dealers, insurers, former employees, and public officials are among the correspondents. Letters discuss orders for supplies and equipment, boiler inspections, employment prospects for laborers at Longwood Plantation, and agreements with commission merchants and dealers. In his letters to elected officials and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture Sabin, Jr., works to promote the Louisiana syrup industry, particularly the sale of surplus syrup to public institutions (1949), and comments on the lunch program in the African American schools (April 5, 1949). (See also "government correspondence). Other correspondence tells of laborers seeking employment at the plantation (1895-1899), an insurer requesting updates on an injured worker (1947), housing for laborers (Aug. 21, 25, 1948), Additionally, correspondence shows his attempt to copyright his trademark for Longwood Plantation syrup (1939-March 1951).

Subseries 2. Sabin, Jr. and Vivian Gianelloni correspondence, 1937-1957.

This subseries consists of the correspondence between Sabin Gianelloni, Jr. at Longwood Plantation and his brother, Vivian, in Cuba. Letters reflect their business interests and family matters. They write extensively about their plantation operations, as well as the use of their lands for logging, oil production, agriculture, and cattle. Letters also relate to crop production, sugar prices, and effects of government policies on agriculture (1940-1941), particularly the sugar industry (1944). Additionally, the brothers discuss their concerns over the economic and political conditions in Louisiana, the United States, and Cuba and comment on price controls and restrictions on production and trade. They also comment on the price controls, restrictions on production and trade.

Vivian comments on the conflict between the Cuban government and the revolutionaries (Feb. 12, 1943, Aug. 4, 21, 25, 1948), Sabin, Jr., reports on the operations of Longwood Plantation, oil leases and land use. Additionally, they write about the sugar industry and the political environment in Central America, particularly Guatemala (Jan.-Feb., 1951, May 18, 1953, April 26, 1954), and the effect of the Korean War on the sugar industry (July 11, 19 1950). Sabin, Jr. tells of his purchase of Magnolia Plantation (Aug. 24, 28, Sept. 24, 1951), and his switch from sugar production to cattle (1953). He and Vivian also write of the loss of agricultural lands to chemical and industrial plants in Cuba (Oct. 1, 1956) and Louisiana (Oct. 15, 1956). Vivian also remarks on the accidental death of a sawmill worker (Aug. 4, 1948).

In addition, letters also discuss family matters, the succession of Sabin J. Gianelloni, Sr. (1937), a family dispute concerning property (1937), and the financial affairs and business activities of other family members.

Subseries 3. Family correspondence, 1890-1975, undated.

Letters concern family matters, sugar industry, and the political environment in Louisiana, United States, Cuba, and Central America. An early letter to Sabin, Sr., reports on a confirmed case of “charbon” (anthrax) (June 22, 1899). Another written in French comments on an upcoming christening (May 6, 1894). In letters to his parents, Vivian criticizes the negative impact of the Chadbourne Plan on the sugar industry (Jan. 22, 1932), and he expresses his concern about the mortgage moratorium (April 3, 1933). He writes of political unrest in Cuba and Central America, particularly, Guatemala (1933). He also remarks on Huey P. Long, Franklin Roosevelt, and the Cuban president, Geraldo Machado, (1933, Sept. 27, 1935). Correspondence tells of the political changes occurring in Cuba, the confiscation of land and livestock (Nov.-Dec. 1959, April 4, 30, Aug 23 1962, Feb. 16, March 13, 1963) and transferring assets out of the country (June-Aug. 1960).

Sabin Jr. expresses an anti-communist sentiment (1963, 1967) and criticizes the United States’ lack of support for the anti-Castro Cubans in Florida (June 24, 15, 1963). American Colonization Society promotes the “repatriation” of African American to Africa (1969). Marjorie Gianelloni describes several of her trips (1959-1960) including one to Europe (April-May 1960). The majority of later correspondence consists of letters of solicitation from political and charitable organizations. Correspondence relating he estate of Vivian Gianelloni is also included.

Subseries 4. Government correspondence, 1892-1954.

This subseries consist of correspondence primarily between Sabin, Jr. and local and federal officials concerning roads, levees, and the effect of federal regulations on the syrup industry. Early correspondence of Sabin, Sr., and E. M. Lefebvre is to the Pontchartrain Levee Board and discusses Board business and flooding near Longwood Plantation (Nov. 14, 1892, 1898). In his letters to local officials Sabin, Jr., reports on poor conditions of roads south of Baton Rouge, the need for maintenance on Hwy 63 south of Gardere Lane, and the extension of Nicholson Dr. (Dec. 1940-1951). He also writes to the Pontchartrain Levee Board reporting on the erosion of the Mississippi River levee south of Baton Rouge (Oct.-Dec. 1944, April-May, 1945 June-July 1946).

The majority of this correspondence relates to government policies and their impact on the sugar and syrup industries. Sabin, Jr., writes to politicians and government officials as a syrup producer, as a member of the Louisiana Cane Syrup and Molasses Industry Advisory Board, and as president of the Louisiana Syrup Association. Correspondence discusses possible disadvantages to minimum wage increases (1940-1945, 1949), price controls, and limits on production, and surplus syrup. Correspondence also addresses quality standards for the syrup and molasses industry (1949-1951), tax laws (Feb.-April 1946). Letters written during World War II and the post-war period reflect the difficulties experienced by the cane syrup producers due to production limits, price controls, and rationing (1942-1948).

Series III. Personal papers, 1890-1969, undated.**Subseries 1. Papers, 1890-1969, undated.**

Personal papers are comprised of certificates of appointment to the Board of Commissioners for the Pontchartrain Levee District (1897, 1900), two Cuban lottery tickets (1890), membership cards for Elks Lodge, No. 492 (1905-1916, 1932), class notebooks (1910), railway ticket (1918), certificates, and notations on the back of calling cards (undated).

Subseries 2. Audio tapes and transcriptions, 1969.

Sabin, Jr., records his *Stories--1969 As I Remember* (1969) on these audio tapes. In this narrative, he gives an account of his ancestors in Corsica and the history of Longwood Plantation. He tells of life on the plantation, flooding, African American laborers, the first electric lights, and the first automobiles. He also describes the political and economic environment in Louisiana in the first half of the 20th-century. He discusses crop prices, wages, and cost of living during that period. Tape #3 begins with short comments on passed employees, but is mostly a recording of Italian music.

Note: There are no tapes #6 and #7, and no transcription for tapes #3 and 8.

Series IV. Printed items and graphic material, 1858-1975, undated.

Printed items consist of advertisements, price lists and catalogs, publications, clippings, bulletins, and information distributed by the federal government. Advertisements, price lists, and catalogs promote the sale of plantation and sugarhouse equipment, supplies and services, household furniture, and carriages (ca. 1890s, 1909, undated). Publications consist of comparative stocks and prices of the *New York Sugar Market* (Nov. 10, 1858) and issues of P. A. Champomier's of *Statement of Sugar ...* (1844-1862). Clippings report on issues affecting the cane syrup industry (1949, undated) and Fidel Castro's regime in Cuba (Aug. 20, 1962). An article by D. Ward King in which recommends improvements to dirt roads (Oct. ca. 1912) is also found.

Bulletins include Allis-Chalmers Co. *Bulletin* (1909-1916, originally bound) and Louisiana *School Lunch News* (1949). Issues of the *Cuban Press Monitor* reflect the business interests in Cuba (Dec.1959-Apr. 1960). A published pamphlet provides the text to a libel suit brought by Judge Calvin K. Schwing of Iberville Parish, La., against the publishers of the *Iberville Sentinel* and *Champion* (1909). There is also an inventory of Ben Hur Plantation for public auction (1894).

Printed items relating to the syrup industry refer to subsidies, rations, wages, price controls, crop, standards, and production. They also include notices for proposed rules governing production of sugarcane molasses and syrup (Sept. 26, 1950), crop reports for Louisiana, Mississippi, and Alabama (1950-1951), and quarterly reports on production submitted to the Food Distribution Administration (Sept., Dec. 1944, 1946). A speech presented by U.S. Senator Newton C. Blanchard of Louisiana discusses the sugar tariff (July 20, 1894). In his analysis titled *The New Frontier of America, Agriculture ...* (ca. 1940), Sabin, Jr. discusses the conflict between agriculture and industry (ca. 1940).

Material issued directly by the federal government concerns the Sugar Act, H.R.4075 (July 2, 1947), fair labor standards (Oct. 1949), orders and amendments to regulations

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(Sept. 1942-1946), and a report to Congress on the sugar situation (1945). Items distributed by the Louisiana Syrup Association that voice opposition to wage legislation (1949) are also present.

Graphic material consists of blueprints of sugarhouse equipment (1897, 1901, 1912, undated), plans of Longwood sugarhouse with notations (1915), blueprints for the Gianelloni cemetery monument (1925), and photographs. Photographs depict Longwood Plantation laborers in the cane fields (1909), Longwood Plantation store (ca. 1907), an aerial view of Longwood Plantation (Jan. 20, 1941), and the St. Gabriel Church bell (1975). In addition, this series contains labels for Longwood Plantation syrup (undated), business cards, calling cards, dress patterns (1899), and blank stock certificates for Dougherty-Gianelloni Sugar Co.
